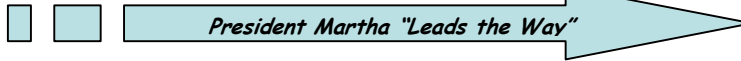

Happy birthday to Reno Rotary, 90 years old on August 1.

In 1916 the Reno Commercial Club with 43 members became Reno Rotary, which is now the largest club in District 5190 with over 200 members.

Original members' names include: Billingham, Lemmon and Lake; familiar names of schools and places.

Knowing that Rotary has a 90-year history here in the Truckee Meadows confirms that this part of the world has a long tradition of offering a helping hand to those who need it.

I'm proud to be a part of that tradition and wish Reno Rotary many more years of *Service above Self*.

RI has a program called *Why I am a Rotarian* in which famous Rotarians explain why they became a Rotarian and why they are still a Rotarian. Since I have a little leftover space today I thought I would share my experience as a Rotarian.

I became a Rotarian because of a family competition. Elizabeth and Dick Bradt lived in Reno for about 3 years. He was a professor at UNR and she was the library's web master. Elizabeth invited me to a Zonta meeting and indicated that she would like to sponsor me as a member. I liked all the women I met there and was seriously considering joining. Then Dick decided to go his wife one better and he invited me to Rotary. That first meeting I was way early and very nervous about whether I would be welcomed. And, then I

saw John Albrecht, whom I knew from Toastmasters and Gary Foote, who provided copiers to the library and I did feel welcome. I decided that Rotary was more influential than Zonta and that being a member of Rotary was more prestigious. That was in 1994 and I've never looked back. I'm very proud of being a Rotarian and of being president of the best club in Area 8!

Coach Chris Ault, Head Coach Wolfpack Football

When he returned to the helm of the Wolf Pack football program for the third time in December 2003, College Football Hall of Fame coach Chris Ault made a bold statement. He said that winning at Mackay Stadium was paramount and once that was established, the Wolf Pack could move toward winning championships and bowl games. And in the last two seasons, Ault and the Wolf Pack have been able to do what he said. Nevada has turned in a 10-2 record at Mackay Stadium in the past two years, earned a share of its first Western Athletic Conference title and made the team's first bowl appearance since 1996.

Now heading into the third season of his third stint at the helm of his alma mater, Ault has turned the corner in restoring championship-caliber football to the University of Nevada. With his squad sporting its highest team grade-point average in years and three solid recruiting classes in the fold, excitement surrounds Ault and the Wolf Pack as they prepare to compete for another WAC championship and garner another bowl bid in 2006.

Reno Sunrise Rotary On Going Service Projects

Virginia Palmer Elementary School - We provide both financial support and hands on support for Virginia Palmer Elementary School in the Sun Valley community in north Reno.

Rotary Youth Exchange (RYE) - We participate in Rotary's international high school exchange program.

Ambassadorial Scholars - An international scholarship program for college and university students to study for one year in a foreign country.

Group Study Exchange - This Rotary Foundation program help foster international understanding and goodwill by exposing young professionals and business people to their counter parts in other countries.

Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) - This is a one-week summer camp that helps to develop high school leaders.

PolioPlus - Rotary International is leading the effort to eradicate polio from the world.

Matching Grants - A Rotary Foundation program in which two or more Rotary clubs in two or more countries partner to support one Rotary sponsored program/project. Reno Sunrise has partnered in several matching grant with its Twin Rotary Club in Poland.

World Community Service - A World Community Service project is born when Rotary clubs from two or more countries join together to accomplish a community service project. The WCS program links Rotary clubs needing extra help with clubs in other countries that are willing to provide funds, materials, and technical and professional assistance.
